







Would you like to help us understand the impact of Long COVID on nurses, teachers, ambulance clinicians and police officers in Scotland?

Researchers from the Universities of Stirling and Glasgow, Robert Gordon University and the Scottish Ambulance Service are carrying out a study about the impacts of Long COVID on people working in public sector nursing, teaching, ambulance, and police services in Scotland.

We'd like to hear from you if you are:

 A nurse, teacher, ambulance clinician or police officer who has, or has recovered from, Long COVID (even if you are on sick leave or have had to change role/job since having Long COVID).

OR

 A nurse, teacher, ambulance clinician or police officer who works with or has worked with someone affected by Long COVID.

OR

 Responsible for managing nurses, teachers, ambulance clinicians or police officers who have been affected by Long COVID or you plan service delivery in these public services in Scotland.

What happens if you take part?

- Taking part will involve doing a one-to-one interview with a researcher lasting around 45-60 mins. (We can do a couple of shorter interviews with you if this suits you better). These will usually be online or on the phone.
- All the interview questions are optional, so you can choose not to answer any of the questions and are free to stop at any time.
- You will be offered a £20 voucher as a thank you for taking part.
